During the height of the pandemic, we rapidly expanded our delivery services to help Rhode Islanders at an elevated risk of illness related to COVID-19 stay safe at home.

In 2021, we began serving 10 percent more clients than we were before the pandemic, filling a need that predates COVID-19 but that the pandemic helped uncover, thanks to the partnership and support of all the corporations, foundations, and individuals that you will read about in the following pages.

Now, in 2022, we continue to meet that growth in service while we also look to the future and define our vision for the new Meals on Wheels of RI through our strategic planning process.

Through it all we thank you.

Your generous support is what makes our work possible. We could not do what we do without you, serving 3,343 older adult Rhode Islanders through our flagship nutrition programs last year.

Who We Are



Our Vision

A Rhode Island where all seniors live nourished lives with independence and dignity.

Our Mission

Our mission is to meet the nutritional and other special needs of older adults and other eligible populations in order to help them maintain their independent lifestyles.





History

Meals on Wheels of Rhode Island was established on Feb. 6, 1969 by founder Joe Brown (1924-2014) who saw an unmet need in his community to provide nutritious meals to homebound seniors.

With a small group of volunteers, he began delivering lunchtime meals to 17 seniors in Providence out of space donated by Grace Church, located in downtown Providence.

In 1972, an amendment to the Older Americans Act allowed great expansion of this new Home-Delivered Meal Program as well as the addition of new and much-needed services to serve homebound seniors statewide.

Within its first 10 years in operation, Meals on Wheels of Rhode Island celebrated the delivery of its one millionth meal to a senior in need.

In 2019, the organization celebrated its 50th year and delivered its 19 millionth meal to a homebound senior. Also in 2019, the organization welcomed its fourth executive director, Meghan Grady, marking a new era of growth for Meals on Wheels of RI as it works to meet the needs of a growing senior population.

In 2021, we delivered more than 357,000 meals to 3,029 seniors through our Home-Delivered Meal Program. Another 314 seniors were served through the Capital City Café Program.

Over the years, much, of course, has changed at Meals on Wheels of Rhode Island, but our mission remains the same—to help enable our state's homebound older adults to remain living independently in their own homes by providing them with complete and nutritious meals, vital safety checks and critical opportunities for socialization.

What We Do

Our vital programming addresses food insecurity & social isolation as risk factors for loss of independence amongst homebound older adults.





Home-Delivered Meal Program

Meals on Wheels of RI's Home-Delivered Meal Program was established in 1969 to help ensure the physical and mental well-being of homebound seniors.

Today, the program remains the only nonprofit meal delivery program of its kind in Rhode Island, serving approximately 1,400 seniors statewide each weekday, from Woonsocket to Westerly.

Program participants receive a complete and nutritious, fully-prepared meal that meets one-third of their recommended daily dietary intake delivered right to their door.

Providing much more than a meal, the Home-Delivered Meal Program also ensures clients' safety through a daily well-being check and works to lessen their feelings of isolation and loneliness with a friendly visit with one of our drivers.

In 2021, the program served 3,029 individuals and is on track to deliver its 20-millionth meal in mid-2022.

Capital City Café Program

More mobile seniors may participate in Meals on Wheels of RI's Capital City Café Program, which offers socialized dining at dining sites (cafés) throughout the Providence area.

In typical operation, the program provides hot, lunch-time meals that meet one-third of a senior's recommended daily dietary intake, Monday through Friday.

While some café sites have reopened for in-person dining, others remained closed due to the pandemic. Dining days and hours are subject to change.

Nutrition education is often provided at Capital City Café dining sites, along with other programming centered on the older adults' health and wellness needs and interests.



Senior Wish Program

Meals on Wheels of Rhode Island's Senior Wish Program provides program clients with gift packages of seasonal essentials, everyday necessities and other items during the winter holidays.

Through the support of corporate partners and local businesses, "wish gifts" are collected and delivered to clients. In 2021, more than 200 Meals on Wheels of RI clients received gift packages.

Packages included adult coloring books, jumbo playing cards, socks, toiletries, calendars, hats, and much more.

Pet Food Program

Meals on Wheels of RI's Pet Food Program supports clients who depend on their pets for companionship.

By working with local partners and grant funders, we are able to provide pet food and supplies to homebound clients lacking the resources to adequately care for their pets.

Since 1969, Meals on Wheels of RI's programs have directly addressed the issues of food insecurity and social isolation that are risk factors for negative health outcomes amongst older adults. Social isolation, which can be lessened through pet ownership, is known to increase seniors' risk of heart disease, stroke, dementia, depression and anxiety.

Senior Restaurant Program

Meals on Wheels of Rhode Island is proud to offer a statewide restaurant program to Rhode Island seniors, aged 60 or older.

Program participants can enjoy dining out at participating restaurants, where they can choose from a select menu of meals designed to meet one-third of their recommended daily dietary intake.

Culturally Responsive Meals

In late December 2021, we introduced a culturally responsive meal menu at one of our Capital City Café Program dining sites. In 2022, we will be exploring ways to expand meal menus throughout our programs.

In 1969, while working on his Master's Degree in the Gerontology Program at the University of Rhode Island, Joseph Brown founded the RI Meals on Wheels Program. Working originally out of Grace Church in Providence with his wife Fern and 17 volunteers, he led RI Meals on Wheels to become one of the largest such programs in the country, and the only state-wide program. He served as Executive Director for 22 years, and on the Board of Directors for 45 years. Elected as a Lifetime Member in 2011, he continued to attend every meeting he could. At the time of his death in 2014, 17,493,528 million meals had been served in RI.


